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1. Talk about the characters, both good and bad. Describe their personalities and motivations. Are they fully developed and emotionally complex? Or are they flat, one-dimensional heroes and villains?
2. At what point in the book did you begin to piece together what happened?
3. The story includes a lot of build-up--character-building time as folks arrive to the island--before the wedding even begins. How does the author manage to build suspense and keep readers' attention even while there is not much activity going on in the present?
4. Why do you think the author chose to tell the story from the six perspectives she did?
5. Which moment shocked you the most and why?
6. In the end, Johnno takes the blame for Will's murder--is this fair? Do you think he understands who the real culprit might be? Do you think he will reveal them?
7. Which character were you most engaged with? Which one the least? Why?
8. What do you think about Hannah's storyline? She is horrified to find out that Charlie and Jules slept together after the birth of their child. Do you think Hannah will leave Charlie or will they stay together?
9. If you were going to make this book into a movie, who would you cast and why?
